At 11:30 am May 29, 1953, Sir Edmund Hilary became the first man to reach the summit of Mount Everest, the highest peak on earth – 29,002 feet above sea level. No one will ever climb higher.

In our text today Abraham will make an ascent to the peak of a spiritual mountain – Moriah. Only Christ will climb higher when He ascends to top of Calvary.

Chapter 22 gives us the faintest glimpse of what Calvary means to the Father.

"All that Moriah meant to Abraham in terms of agony and heartache and pain; that a thousandfold, tenthousandfold, is what Calvary meant to God." (Phillips, 1980) page 179

"A watch that no longer truly records the passage of time has very little worth; a man who does not glorify God in his life negates the purpose for which he was made." (Phillips, 1980) page 180

tested Abraham, and said to him, "Abraham!"

5254 – "To put to the test in order to ascertain the nature of something, including imperfections, faults, or other qualities."

And he said, "Here Tam."

"...the way to increase faith is to exercise faith." (Hughes, 2004) page 301

Everything that had transpired in Abraham's life was preparing him for this test. God always prepares us for the tests He gives us.

It is estimated that fourteen to sixteen years have passed. This would make Isaac between seventeen and nineteen.

son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of

Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on

5927 – "To present a burnt sacrifice to a deity as an offering." 5930 – "A kind of sacrifice that included the acceptable parts of the sacrificial animal being

one of the mountains of which Tshall tell you."

We know it was a test but Abraham did not. From this we learn that faith during testing involves not understanding what God is doing but trusting Him enough to go along with what He wants you to do.

Abraham knew exactly what God mean when he said 'offer him. He had made many animals sacrifices to God. First the animal's throat is cut, its blood is drained, then it is dismembered and burned on the fire.

Human sacrifice is outside our experience and the thought is repulsive to most people. But to Abraham, he had come from a culture where human sacrifice was practiced and some of the cultures in Canaan also engaged in human sacrifice.

"God was asking him to act against common sense, his natural affections, and his lifelong hope." (Hughes, 2004) page 301

We are not told how Abraham felt after hearing this horrific command from the Lord, but we can try to imagine the unbelievable torment he would have felt, maybe doubts and questions. If he did feel those things, he didn't express them, and they didn't keep him from obedience.

He didn't tell the young men, or Isaac what was going really on. It wasn't a lie because every act of obedience is an act of worship.

'...we will come back...' – what a tremendous display of faith. We know by reading the rest of the account that Abraham intended to go through with God's command and he also expected to come back with Isaac – alive.

Abraham believed God when He said it would be through Isaac that a great multitude of people would be born. Abraham reasoned that if he obeyed God and sacrificed Isaac as he was told that God would have to rise him from the dead to keep His promise to Abraham. What amazing faith!

The writer of Hebrews tells us that Abraham believed that God would raise him from the dead (Heb. 11:17-19). This is truly astonishing because at this point there is no record of anyone ever being raised from the dead. Here we have the beginning of what will become one of the key doctrines of the church – the bodily resurrection of the dead.

As the bearer of the wood, Isaac was the stronger of the two. There is no way that Abraham could have bound his son without his consent. Isaac trusted his father implicitly. It is likely also that he trusted God but that is not told to us about him yet.

Isaac is a willing participant in what is going on. And he appears to do it silently. This same behavior is described of Jesus (Isa. 53:7).

"It is all so simple. We grow in faith as we believe the bare Word of God. The process is this: God comes to us with His Word, and we are challenged to believe. When we believe His Word, He tests us by stretching our faith so it can grow to greater dimensions than before. There are always valleys next to the hilltops of faith. There are ups and downs. But God grows our faith incrementally, so that we are enabled to give our 'Isaacs' to God." (Hughes, 2004) page 305
