Notes:

'famine' = extreme scarcity of food. A famine is a widespread scarcity of food, caused by several factors including war, inflation, crop failure, population imbalance, or government policies. This phenomenon is usually accompanied or followed by regional malnutrition, starvation, epidemic, and increased mortality.

On a spiritual level God might bring an extreme scarcity into a person's life to bring that person to the point that they humble themselves before Him and repent.

In this account we see the Egyptians being stripped of everything they have depended upon to save themselves. The sad reality is that some people need to lose a lot and sometimes they need to lose everything before they realize they need God to save and they let Him do it.

Scriptures: Matthew 19:23-24 - Then Jesus said to His disciples, "Assuredly, I say to you that it is hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. 24 And again I say to you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God."

Notes: The famine was so bad that the Egyptians had to use up all their money to survive. Money or the pursuit of wealth can be something that stands in the way of salvation (Matt. 19:23-24).

Notes:

After all the money was gone, the Egyptians started sacrificing their possessions to survive. Possessions or the seeking to acquire possessions can be a stumbling block keeping people from coming to the Lord (1 John 2:15-17).

God is a gracious God and loves giving His children good gifts, but we must never covet things or cling to things at the expense of our love of God. Gladly receive the good gifts that God gives but hold them with an open hand. Be okay if God, who gave the gift, also chooses to take it away or give it to someone else. Joseph gave them bread in exchange for the

horses, the flocks, the cattle of the herds, and for

the donkeys. Thus he fed them with bread in

exchange for all their livestock that year.

¹⁸ When that year had ended, they came to him the All of their liquid assets are gone.

Scriptures: Romans 2:4 - Or do you despise the riches of His goodness, forbearance, and longsuffering, not knowing that the goodness of God leads you to repentance?

All of their liquid assets are gone. They are at the end of themselves. There is nothing they can do to save themselves and they are willing to sacrifice everything to be saved.

God loves us too much to leave us in our lost state. And so, He begins by showering us with His goodness in the hopes that we will turn to Him (Rom. 2:4). If that doesn't work, He might begin stripping things out of our life until we repent.

The people realized that apart from Joseph they would be lost forever. That is God's desire for all humanity. God wants all humanity to realize they need Jesus to save them. Until someone realizes that they will remain in their lost state. If there had not been a famine, the Egyptians would never realize their need.

There is a story (July 2021) circulating in social media that sounds strange to me but may be common in the not-too-distant future. The story is of a couple who had a baby recently. The mother is a woman who identifies as a man. She is upset because the hospital wants to list her on the birth certificate as the mother - she wants her husband to be listed as the mother. She is married to a man who identifies as a woman. He attempts to nurse the baby and is upset because the baby is not getting any milk and they resign themselves to having to 'supplement' with formula. They refuse to identify the gender of the baby because that is something the child will do when "it" is ready.

Our culture is encouraging people to embrace their lostness. By normalizing behaviors that God disapproves of, people will go through their lives believing that what they are doing is right and good. And they will look at anyone who thinks otherwise as unloving and bigoted. And they will go onward down a path that leads to destruction and causes pain and suffering along the way. Our prayer should be that God sends a 'famine' into their lives that causes them to look for someone to save them. And we, as God's people, must be prepared to lovingly bring them to their Savior Jesus.

The Egyptians were thankful for what Joseph had done to save them. Their response was to give themselves as servants to Pharaoh, whom Joseph represented. As bornagain believers, this should our response to being saved. As an expression of our gratitude to Jesus saving us, we ought to offer ourselves as servants of God.

Egypt had been the place God used to save his family. It was the place God would use to make his family into a great nation. Egypt was never Jacob's home. His home was n the Promised Land of Canaan.

As Christians, we live in this world, but this world is not our home. We have been promised a better home – a home not built with human hands. We have been promised heaven (John 14:1-3).

That reality should influence our attitudes toward money, possessions, and our lives.
