#### Notes:

Context: A famine had taken place in Israel. The Christians in Jerusalem were mostly Jews who had accepted Christ. To the Jews of that time, there was nothing worse than turning away from Judaism. Often resulted in separation of family, loss of occupation, and other forms of persecution. The famine would have exasperated this persecution.

When times are tough, most people think only of themselves and those closest to them. As Christians, we are called to think of others in need in spite of our own need.

"There is a wonderful principle that runs all through this chapter, the principle of brotherly fellowship with those in need." (Ironside, 1938) page 416

When we sense Christ's grip upon our soul, our grip upon worldly possessions and wealth is loosened.

"So we understand, theologically, that authentic salvation changes our orientation to wealth. If our professed salvation has not loosed our grip on material things so that we have become giving people, we are not saved, despite our protestations." (Hughes, 2006) page 156

'grace of God' = the gracious inclination to give (Hughes)

This grace, as with all graces, flow out of our reconciliation to God through Christ (2 Cor. 5:18-6:1).

The word grace 'charis' appears eight times in chapters 8-9.

'churches of Macedonia' – Philippi, Thessalonica, and Berea – were poor churches

"Because ours is a society that is preoccupied with 'getting,' we often fail to experience personally the truth of Christ's saying, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive(Acts 20:35).""

'affliction' They were under immense pressure from the surrounding culture trying to squeeze them into its shape.

Their poverty and affliction was not an excuse, but an opportunity - to express joy in their salvation and generosity in their giving.

What are we using as an excuse not to rejoice in our salvation and to express generosity, even in our poverty?

"Giving is a grace." (Ironside, 1938) page 417

"I do not think that means that they gave large sums. They probably did not have large sums to give, but thee little was regarded by God as a larger gift than if very much more had come from people far more wealthy than the Macedonians." (Ironside, 1938) page 417 (Luke 12:44 – widow's mites)

"Assuredly, I say to you that this poor widow has put in more than all those who have given to the treasury; 44 for they all put in out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all that she had, her whole livelihood." Romans 12:6-8 - Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, let us prophesy in proportion to

Paul could see their deep poverty and was inclined to ask nothing of them for fear that their giving might deepen their poverty. But they would not be denying the grace of giving.

The grace of giving sees giving as a privilege to be joyously engaged in.

The Macedonians did not have to be pressured into giving. They were pressuring Paul to allow them to give. Paul may have been reluctant to anything from them because of their poverty.

The Macedonians saw an opportunity to join in God's work and they implored Paul to let them help.

"Joy and Christian growth come to those who assume the responsibility for the Lord's work gladly." (Chafin, 1985) page 256

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Scriptures: Romans 12:1-2 - I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. 2 And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God.

"Grace is first rooted in our response to God. When we know that our lives are not our own, neither will we think that our possessions are our own. It's easy to surrender part when we've already given the whole." (Hughes, 2006) page 158

It doesn't really do a lot of good to give your possessions to God if you have not first given yourself to Him. In fact, doing so can do you harm. External giving can lead to religious pride. It might cause you to believe that your giving is how you please God. It gives in the hopes that God will respond. The grace of giving is generous as a response to what God has already done – it expects nothing in return.

"If I have given myself to the Lord, the rest all follows." (Ironside, 1938) page 418

This is a key to the grace of God. If I have not given myself to God, then all my giving is likely to be carnal and religious. One I have given myself to the Lord, I realize that everything I 'own' actually is God's. The grace of giving then can flow freely and joyfully from me, regardless of my circumstances.

"Those who give their money but not their hearts have made a lesser gift." (Chafin, 1985) page 256

#### Notes:

'this grace' – the giving of a generous gift to the needy Christians in Jerusalem (1 Cor. 16:1-4). This had been interrupted by Paul's detractors who were questioning his authority and authenticity.

"He (Paul) knew they (Corinthian Christians) needed to feel the responsibility for their brothers and sisters in Christ if they were to grow spiritually." (Chafin, 1985) page 251

Notes:

Paul is calling them to grow to maturity and saying that the grace of giving was a necessary step in that growth.

"There is no way to grow to spiritual maturity without committing your finances to the Lord. Jesus can have our money without our hearts, but he cannot have our hearts without our money." (Hughes, 2006) page 159

Paul is saying, just as the Macedonians gave, without using their poverty as an excuse, they should not wait for an opportune time to give but to give as the Spirit leads them.

Giving is a matter of the heart and is a function of faith. The Macedonians had every reason not to be generous but were.

"These words stress the truth that learning to be generous with material things is a matter of spiritual growth and maturity." (Chafin, 1985) page 254

Generosity is an evidence of faith.

This is not speaking about our regular giving to the local church. It is specifically referring to generosity toward other churches.

Paul uses Jesus as the highest example of the grace of giving.

The Macedonians had been struck with the beauty of Christ's grace of giving and felt compelled to follow His example.

Christ gave Himself for us. We receive His grace, and then give ourselves to Him and to others in His name. This response of grace includes what we have.

It is incongruent that someone who calls themselves a Christian would struggle with the concept of sacrificial giving. God sacrifices His own Son (John 3:16). Jesus laid His life down for us (John 10:15). Christians should be willing to do the same (John 15:13).

A paradox: giving becomes a joy when it is a sacrifice.

"Paul lays down the principle that people who give generously out of love for the Lord and for His church grow and mature in their faith because they don't count the cost." (Chafin, 1985) page 255

It appears that Paul did not handle the money himself. This is also a practice within our church. I do not handle the offering at any point, nor am I aware of how much anyone in the church gives.

"The Lord knows what we do with the money, but he (Paul) says, 'That is not enough; we want God's people to know also." (Ironside, 1938) page 420
