Paul is saying that he was in no way inferior to his detractors, the superapostles. He described himself as 'nothing' but was not inferior to them. They practiced aggressive self-promotion, telling everyone how great they were. By inference Paul is saying his detractors are nothing also.

'for in nothing...' – in one breath Paul is saying his ministry is as important as any other apostle's ministry (assigned to by Christ). And in the next breath says that he is not worthy of notice. This is true Christian humility in service. The ministry is vitally important, but the servant is not to be noticed. That is a hard thing to accept and live out in the ministry.

The minister is nothing – Christ is all!

"The church of God is the holiest thing there is on earth, and yet there are a great many imperfections in that church." (Ironside, 1938) page 458

If God has assigned you to a place of ministry, it would be wrong to think lightly of it. God thought it was important enough that He assigned one of His precious servants the role of completing it.

Paul had led the Corinthians to Christ. He was their spiritual father and they were telling their spiritual father that he was doing everything wrong.

This is the heart of true pastoral ministry.

Paul's detractors were living off of the Corinthians while Paul lived off his own labors and the support of other churches. Paul didn't want their money, he wanted all of them, not for himself but for God so that he could present them to Christ as His bride (2 Cor. 11:2). He identified his ministry with that of Christ's (Eph. 5:27).
