The problem with this weed was that it was almost indistinguishable from the wheat. It is only in the later state of development that they can be identified. Once the tare had developed to the point where it could be identified, its roots would be entangled in the roots of the wheat. Pulling the tare would harm the wheat. Even though it was not ideal for the growth of the wheat to leave the tare, it would be more harmful to try to remove them.

Before the time of the harvest, we are incapable of telling the wheat from the tares. We must allow them both to grow up until then. This also means that some people may look like tares but are actually wheat.

What this means for us in the church is that we should treat everyone with love and patience.

The mustard seed is very small, but, in the right soil, can grow quite large – maybe seven or eight feet tall or taller. It is also a popular food of small birds in the area.

One interpretation of this parable is that the church started out very small but would grow to be quite large and be a place of comfort, safety, and nourishment to those who sought its shelter.

Leaven is used to improve the taste of bread. As leaven ferments in the dough, it creates gas bubbles that make bread soft and spongy. Unleavened bread is hard and unappetizing.

Leaven or yeast is often associated with evil in the Bible but not always (Leviticus 23:17).

An interpretation of this parable is that the gospel acts as leaven in people and in the world. It takes dry unappealing people and transforms them into saints.

The work of the gospel is often hidden in a person's heart. The gospel, the Word of God, slowly, silently, works its way through all parts of someone's life.

God's Word has the power to transform the driest of hearts into something beautiful and refreshing to those who experience it. If your faith is feeling a little dry, dive into God's Word, get into a Bible study, seek God and you will find Him and be refreshed yourself.

The main message of this parable is that good and evil will always be found together in the professing church until Jesus comes back for us. No matter how diligent we might try to be to verify everyone's faith, there will be tares in the church. They might be sitting next to you during the service. They might be serving in ministry somewhere.

Even Jesus had a weed among the Twelve – Judas Iscariot.

Scriptures: 1 John 2:1-2 - My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous. 2 And He Himself is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the whole world.

Jesus tells us to leave the pulling of the weeds to the angels in the end of the age. If we are too aggressive pulling the weeds, we risk pulling up the wheat as well. And, it is always too soon to write someone off as a tare forever.

"Those who are weeds today may be wheat tomorrow." Augustine (Ryle, 1993) page 107

There are some who believe it is the mission of the church to convert the whole world to Christianity and then Jesus will return to establish His kingdom. This clearly tells us that is not how it will work. There will always be people who reject and resist the gospel and the Kingdom of God will only come when Jesus returns.

We do have a responsibility to watch out for wolves. The wolf seeks to lead the flock away and devour it. This is often done through the introduction of false doctrine.

We must also respond to those who willfully disobey God's clear teaching. Paul had to deal with a man having an affair with his mother-in-law (1 Corinthians 5:4-5).

Jesus is being very clear – the consequence for not being one of His people is suffering and torment forever.

'furnace of fire' – It is hard to imaginable a more horrible fate than to be burned alive. The only hope a person in the fire would have is the escape of death. In the fire Jesus is talking about there is no hope (Mark 9:43).

This is one of the reasons why we teach through the Bible, through the easy things and the hard things, through the encouraging things and the challenging things. Only God knows the state the heart of every person who listens or watches these messages, we teach as though there are both wheat and tares in the congregation. We want those are not God's people to know God loves them, but we also want them to know that they can't hide among the wheat and hope to escape the judgment that is coming to them. We want them to stop being a tare and be transformed though the power of God's forgiveness as wheat – one of His children.

Scriptures: Colossians 3:4 - When Christ who is our life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory. 43 Then the righteous will shine forth as the

sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who

has ears to hear, let him hear!

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Notes:

The righteous must tolerate the wicked until Christ comes back. One of the things that helps us to do that is the hope we have of being in heaven with Jesus.

The world sees little beauty in the church. But once the wicked are removed from it, it will shine like the sun in brilliance (Colossians 3:4).

'ears to hear' – Jesus is speaking to His disciples. These are the men He will entrust with the gospel and commission to take that gospel to the whole world.

There are some who teach a gentler, milder, more palatable message. Jesus is clearly stating that people need to hear both sides of the matter of salvation.

"They were to contrast evil with goodness; religion and righteousness; sanctimoneousness and salvation; hell with heaven. They were entrusted with this message." (Powell, 1986) page 259
