'from there' = region of Tyre and Sidon (Matthew 5:21).

Marks gospel places this account in the region of Decapolis on the easter coast of the sea of Galilee (Mark 7:31). This was near where Jesus had cast 'Legion' out of the demoniac (Mark 5:18-20).

Sea of Galilee, and went up on the mountain

Scriptures:

The last time Jesus was here the people of that area had begged Jesus to leave after He healed the demoniac which resulted in the death of thousands of pigs.

Jesus told the man delivered from the demons to go and tell what had been done for him. It is possible that this multitude is the fruit of him doing that.

'...at Jesus' feet...' – The answer to all our troubles, difficulties, and questions is found here – at Jesus' feet. The feet that walked on water as Lord of creation is able to handle anything we bring to Him by faith.

Jesus is out in the wilderness. People hear that Jesus in there and they travel miles to get a chance to be laid at Jesus' feet for healing. It is natural for people to expend serious amounts of time and resources to tend to their physical well-being, while at the same time neglecting the state of their soul.

When we struggle with something physically, especially if pain is involved, it forces us to focus on it. The problem with the soul is that we might not notice when it is weak or sick. Most people, including many in churches, are blind to the fact that their soul is sick with sin.

As believers, we like to believe that our soul is no longer sick. We might think we have the cure — we have Jesus. Having Jesus means that our disease is no longer terminal spiritually. But just like some physical diseases, even though it is no longer terminal, it is still there and needs to be treated regularly.

Treatments for the sin-sick soul: Repentance and confession Study Seek help

While we are in these bodies of flesh, our soul will be sick with sin. By seeking God and walking in faith and obedience with Him we minimize the effects of our soul-sickness. Our cure is in heaven.

There is no sin-sickness Jesus can't heal. We can bring our temptations, lusts, wrong desires, wrong thoughts, painful memories, doubts, frustrations, and our guilt to Jesus and lay them at His feet and He can heal it. He can strengthen the spiritually weak. He can give courage to the fearful. He can increase our faith. We just need to come to Him and lay it at His feet and trust Him (Matthew 11:28-30). Jesus is still working miracles.

Scriptures: Matthew 12:22-24 -Then one was brought to Him who was demonpossessed, blind and mute; and He healed him, so that the blind and mute man both spoke and saw. 23 And all the multitudes were amazed and said. "Could this be the Son of David?" 24 Now when the Pharisees heard it they said, "This fellow does not cast out demons except by

Notes:

This is Gentile territory. Most of the people coming to Jesus for healing are Gentiles. This is supported by the phrase, 'the God of Israel'.

These miracles result in the Gentiles glorifying 'the God of Israel'. The miracles testified to the truth that Jesus was the Messiah. The same kinds of miracles had a different effect upon the religious leaders of Israel (Matthew 12:22-24).

This seems like such an odd thing for them to say. It was not that long ago that they witnessed the feeding of the five thousand. Could they have forgotten that quickly? Maybe! Jesus would ask them a similar question later (Mark 8:14-21).

It would have been very hard for a Jew to imagine a Gentile as being worthy of their Messiah. It is possible they didn't think Jesus would do that kind of miracle in Gentile territory.

The last time Jesus did this miracle, the Jews tried to take Him by force and make Him king. Maybe they believed He might hesitate to do something that might result in a similar response.
