Notes:

Start with Matthew 19:16-30. Verse 20:16 says the same thing. They make bookends to this section.

This parable is only recorded by Matthew. It follows immediately after the account of the rich young ruler. He had come asking Jesus what he needed to do to get eternal life. He went away sad because Jesus told him that his wealth was standing between him and God. Peter then asked what he and the other disciples would get since they had sacrificed everything to follow Jesus. Jesus promised a great reward for their faithful service. Jesus then tells this parable to illustrate what He means.

The key to understanding this parable is that it is focused on rewards for following Christ. Some interpret it to be about salvation. Salvation is not a reward. If it was, it would not be the gracious gift the Bible teaches it is (Ephesians 2:8-9). No one can earn salvation. That is what the rich young ruler believed and went away sad because what he believed couldn't save him.

Jesus is responding to Peter about the rewards of faithfully following Jesus in this life. Jesus responded by telling Peter that the rewards would come 'in the regeneration', or when Jesus came at the Second Coming.

This parable was directed to the disciples but applies to all who choose to follow Christ. Jesus' disciples were not exceptional people. Many of them were common fishermen, called to serve the Savior-King. They had flaws like all of us have. Peter was impulsive. James and John were vengeful. It was not uncommon for them to quarrel with one another (Mark 9:33-34).

If you have responded to Jesus' call to follow Him – meaning you are a believer – this parable is for you.

When it was time to bring in the harvest, additional laborers would be hired to get the work done quickly before the harvest overripened and before the rains come and spoil the harvest.

The landowner is Christ. The vineyard is the lost world. The laborers are believers called by Christ to labor in the fields (John 4:35-38).







Serving God is not a career or a job. Serving God is not a duty. Serving God is not a pathway to fame, fortune, success, or popularity. Serving God is a calling. Jesus calls and we respond. Jesus assigns us the tasks He wants us to do. He is the Master and we are the servants. And as servants we are expected to be faithful. When we stand before Jesus, we will be evaluated based on our faith and faithfulness. It is our faith that will bring into Christ's presence and it our faithfulness that He will rewards. It is not the works themselves that will be rewarded but the faithfulness to the works Jesus appointed to us. The person who is faithful to the one thing Jesus called them to do will be more blessed than the person who was faithful 99 times if he was appointed 100 tasks by Jesus. Be faithful.

It is never too early to serve Christ and it is never too late. Second trait - A faithful servant of Christ is Focused. In the parable, the servants who worked all day were upset when they compared themselves with the others who they feel didn't worked as hard as they did. God is omniscient and sovereign. He knows perfectly what needs to be done, who needs to do. and how it needs to be done. Because we are not God, we probably won't be able to understand why God chooses who He does to do His work. We won't understand why some seem to be very successful while others who seem to be working just as hard are not. To be a faithful servant we must focus on our own service and not on the service of others.

Third trait - A faithful servant of Christ trusts God's character. The servants who complained were questioning the goodness of the landowner. Because we are human, we cannot see the entirety of God's plan. We might see ourselves as more talented than others God is using. Or we might think we are serving God more faithfully or working harder than others. And as we think these things, we might think God is not being fair in how He is using or blessing us. Listen - God is not fair - at least not in the way we decide fairness. God is just, holy, good, perfect, and loving. Everything He does is right or just, holv, good. perfect, and is an expression of His love for you and for the rest of the world. A faithful servant trusts God even when it seems like things are not fair.

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Notes:

Many are called to follow Christ. Few are chosen to labor in the heat of the day and be burdened by the work.

This parable calls us to examine our attitude toward serving God. Why does anyone serve God? The right answer is because that is what they were made to do. I was created by God to serve Him. It is not about the rewards I will get, but it blesses me that there are rewards for serving Him.

There are three things we should consider about serving Christ.

First – Who should serve Christ? Everyone who hears Christ's call to serve. To hear Christ's call, we must be listening and willing to serve. Everyone who is willing will be equipped to serve where Christ wants them.

Second – When should we serve Christ? As soon as we hear Christ's call. In the parable, the landowner when out several times and found laborers who were willing to respond to his call to go out into the vineyard. Some people respond early in their lives, like David. I was in the middle of my life when I responded. Others might not respond until very late in their lives. The right time to respond is when you become aware of Christ's call to serve Him.

Third – How should we serve Christ? In this parable we have a bad example of how to serve Christ. It is possible to serve Christ in a manner that is not rewarded (1 Corinthians 3:10-15). The key to serving Christ in a manner worthy of reward is faithfulness.

Three traits of faithful laborers in Christ's vineyard are:

- Humility
 Focus
- 3. Trust

First trait – A faithful servant of Christ is Humble. There is no place for pride in the heart of a servant of Christ. You did not choose to serve Him, He chose you. You simply responded to His call. Your service was appointed to you by Him. The Holy Spirit equipped you to do the work. Any success you might experience was Jesus working in and through you.
